It's Stewardship Time Again

The literal definition of stewardship is "Holding in trust and managing the estate of another."

Simply put, Christian Stewardship is taking good care of that which God has placed in our lives, including this Church family and its financial needs. Please consider that Stewardship is not our responsibility to the church, but our responsibility AS the church.

Our Church budget is about \$300,000.00 for 2013. Breakdown:

Fixed costs (utilities, supplies, personnel, maintenance, etc.)

\$255,000

Commitment to the Diocese 20,000

Discretionary/Outreach

Where has this typically come from?

Pledges/regular giving

\$235,000

Plate offerings 9,000 Other (Thrift Shop) 56,000

Total \$300,000

As you can see, we have relied heavily on contributions from the Thrift Shop to support the diocese and have some discretionary funding for parish life, vacation Bible school, Christian education, music events, delegate expenses, etc. By funding these critical needs from the Thrift Shop, we are living "hand to mouth" so to speak.

We are grateful for contributions from the Thrift Shop, especially every time it rains. Repairs to the parking lot had been neglected for many years due to budget restraints, but the Thrift Shop supported our new parking lot/ driveways. Also the church's treasurer likes knowing that cash flow from the Thrift Shop provides for a bridge for the lean months of summer.

As we make our stewardship commitments for 2013, we should realize that Thrift Shop funds are wonderful, but if used to pay operating expenses of Holy Spirit, those 25.000 funds will not be available for Total \$300,00 outreach in the community. I am suggesting today that we become more self-sufficient, so our church can grow its ministry.

> As you contemplate your pledge and giving this year, please consider these facts and give, not until it HURTS, but until it FEELS GOOD.

We are getting your pledge cards in and are hoping to have them all by the second week of December. If you haven't submitted yours, please get it in by December 14. We expect to have an approved budget shortly thereafter. We are truly blessed here at Holy Spirit with the gifts God has placed in our care. We are all called to be good stewards by giving, not until it hurts, but until it feels good.



Holy Spirit Thrift Shop

The Thrift Shop continues to thrive, and we continue to give money to a variety of community needs. At the last meeting, the Thrift Shop Board approved a grant of \$1000 for the Christmas Relief Fund.

The Christmas Relief Fund purchases food for families in need in the South Baldwin County area. Children on the 'free meals' program are provided breakfast and lunch at school, but over holidays like Christmas break, many of these children go hungry. The Christmas Relief Fund purchases basic foods and canned goods at deep discounts from area stores and distributes the food to the families. They plan to include a ham or turkey with some of the trimmings - something nice, in addition to the basics. for these families during the holidays. Their goal for 2012 is to feed 75 families! Your Thrift Shop Outreach Ministry will help feed several families over the Christmas break!

Plans will soon be announced for our Five-Year Celebration of the Thrift Shop in January 2013. We want to thank our volunteers, employees, donors and customers for the continuing success of the

Holy Spirit Thrift Shop Outreach mission. Stay tuned!!!

The number of families requesting assistance is very high this year. Needed nonperishable items for those food boxes include: Stuffing mix Chicken broth Canned vegetables Canned fruits Powdered milk Cranberry sauce Yams Green beans Peas Corn Gravy Pears, peaches, etc.

Money can be used to purchase perishable foods such as turkey, ham, chicken, and margarine. You may leave donations in the red wagon or bring them to the church office.

Christmas Cheer also tries to provide three gifts for each registered child 16 or younger. Our Angel Tree in the Parish Hall has paper angels--each listing a child's age, sex, and requested gift. Take as many as you would like to support.

There are always families who have not registered who show up at the last minute asking

for help, so generic gifts are always welcome. Please bring these to the parish hall and leave in the Angel Tree box by *November 30*.
